In 2008 the publishing houses of Bjartur and Veröld were united under the direction of Pétur Már Ólafsson, each imprint maintaining its originality. Hand-in-hand, Bjartur & Veröld is the second largest publishing house in Iceland, committed to publishing smart, interesting titles designed to enrich people's lives.

Bjartur Publishing was founded in 1990. The company's original focus was on translations of world literature, but its publication of contemporary Icelandic works has been steadily increasing. A turning point for Bjartur was the acquisition of the rights to the Harry Potter novels in 1999, and in 2003 the acquisition of rights to the Da Vinci Code for Denmark as well as Iceland, and the subsequent opening of its Danish branch, Hr. Ferdinand.After the merger with Veröld, Bjartur separated from Hr. Ferdinand in 2008, focusing on the Icelandic market and the promotion of its authors abroad.

Verold Publishing was founded in 2005, publishing Icelandic fiction and non-fiction, translated fiction, biographies, illustrated books and children's books.

The latest one, Heaven and Hell, is being published in Germany (Reklam), France (Gallimard) and UK (MacLehose Press). The second part of the novel will be published this autumn and is widely anticipated.



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Jón Hallur Stefánsson (1959)

Jón Hallur Stefánsson is a master of many trades: a skilled songwriter, excellent poet, radio broadcaster; in recent years he has earned a reputation as a sound designer for the theatre. Bjartur Publishing and Jón Hallur have a long and varied relationship, which started with Jón Hallur's translation of a collection of short stories by Julio Cortázar. 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The Incendiary

(Vargurinn, 2008)

The Bough that Breaks


Lilja Sigurðardóttir (1972)

Lilja Sigurðardóttir is a computer technician in Reykjavík. She has a degree in educational theory. **Steps**, her first crime novel, will be published by Bjartur in October 2009.

Steps

A man who had been active in the AA organization is found crucified in a church in Reykjavik. The AA is not very forthcoming in its cooperation with the authorities, so the police needs to find its own source within the organization. A police detective approaches Magni, the detective's ex who is just out of rehab, and asks him for help. While Magni is struggling with his recovery and the abused bodies pile up, it becomes more and more apparent to him that the villain is following the AA's twelve steps in his deeds. And step by step he is getting closer and closer to Magni himself ...

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Ragnar Jónasson (1976)

Ragnar Jónasson is a lawyer in Reykjavik. Having translated more than a dozen of Agatha Christie's bestsellers he decided to write his own crime novel. His debut, **Past Tense**, will be published in October 2009 by Verold.

Past tense

When Ari Thor Arason receives a sky-high credit card invoice from an English bank his world is turned upside down. 


Úlfar Þormóðsson (1944)

Úlfar Þormóðsson has written novels and books on various subjects. His last three novels take place in the 17th century. He takes a new and fresh approach to the past, based on many years of research.

Hallgrímur

Hallgrímur is about the turbulent and dramatic life of Hallgrímur Pétursson, a priest and poet who is one of the biggest names in Icelandic literature. Pétursson chose to travel new and sometimes dangerous paths in both his writings and personal life. At the same time Hallgrímur is a description of the 17th century in Iceland, with its fear of witchcraft and struggles against the powers of evil and merciless nature.



Sindri Freysson (1970)

Sindri Freysson is a journalist and a writer of poetry, short stories and two critically acclaimed novels.

Daughter of My Mothers

(Dóttir mæðra minna, COMING 2009)

In Daughter of My Mothers the world is at war. English soldiers seize a small fishery town where 17 year old Kristin lives. She is arrested along with her mother and they are accused of having aided a German spy. Kristin is transported to England where she is taken to the horrifying Holloway-prison. As London burns in the night, Kristin reconstructs the fascinating tale of her two mothers, one of whom quarter of a century earlier fled oppressive poverty to England, the other a German refugee in Iceland whose entire life has a been a struggle against prejudice, but who is now enjoying the imprisonment a bit too much.



Bergsveinn Birgisson (1971)

In the spring of 2003, Bergsveinn sent Bjartur a manuscript in the mail. The next autumn his first novel was published and was nominated for the Icelandic Literary Prize. Bergsveinn is now Doctor artium from University of Bergen, where he is lector in Old-Norse literature and philology.

Manual on the Mentality of Cows

- A Research-Based Novel

(Handbók um hugarfar kúa – skáldfræðisaga - COMING 2009)

A young culturist moves back home to Iceland after years of studying abroad. Culturists are not in high demand but through some connections he gets an assignment writing a script for a documentary on the Icelandic cow for the Farmers Association and some other parties with interests in cattle breeding. The culturist can not help but discover, through his research, that the fate of men and cows are an intertangled web and that directions in cattle breeding are linked with social developments.

They conquered their difficulties, bringing them closer to each other and making them richer in other ways.

Sigmundur Ernir Rúnarsson (1961)

The Story of Magnea

(Magnea, 2008)

Magnea Gudmundsdottir is an ordinary woman whose destiny is to lead an extraordinary life. Three of her four children have died from the same rare disease. How can one deal with such destiny? 
